

Experience MAHE

MAHE and UNB Launch Second Cohort of Dual Nursing Degree Preceptorship with International Collaboration

As part of academic collaboration established between Manipal Academy of Higher Education (MAHE), Manipal, and the University of New Brunswick (UNB), Canada, the students from the second cohort comprising seven students visited UNB for the MAHE-UNB Preceptorship Program 2024, which is part of UNB's Summer Institute where the students earn a dual



nursing degree, qualifying them to practice in India and Canada. The preceptorship began with a warm welcome to the students and two faculty members, Dr. Linu Sara George, Professor and Mr. Vinish V, Assistant Professor- Senior Scale, of Manipal College of Nursing, (MCON), Manipal, at an opening ceremony on 17 June .Each cohort in MAHE will have 25 students taking the joint degree. The program accepted its first cohort in 2022. There are now two cohorts in the system and a third will begin this August, for 25 students, for the academic year 2024-2025. Graduated students from the dual degree program are qualified to work both in India and Canada and students from India are eligible to take their National Council Licensure Examination for RNs so their accreditation process in Canada will be much faster.

The students will be exposed to two weeks of practical training and observation called a preceptorship, during which they will work alongside nurses at Horizon Health Network and special care facilities operated by Shannex Incorporated.

The opening ceremony was highly solicited with the presence of UNB President and Vice-Chancellor Dr. Paul Mazerolle. He addressed in his opening remarks that the dual degree program has received international attention in its short existence and has established a strong friendship between the two institutions. He noted that the partnership has already led to a joint publication in the Canadian Journal of Nursing Leadership on developing the dual degree model.

Dr. Sharath K. Rao, Pro-Vice-Chancellor Health Sciences at MAHE, addressed the gathering from India via video link. He said healthcare challenges do not respect national boundaries and require collaboration between institutions in different countries. Dr. Rao said these challenges create opportunities, as MAHE and UNB grabbed an opportunity by creating the dual degree. He said besides this practical collaboration in nursing, there were also further joint research opportunities.

Mr. Siddhartha Nath, Consul General of India in Toronto, was also present during the opening ceremony. He said in his remarks that the consulate and Indian government were committed to making it work and that the students would be made aware that New Brunswick embraces its growing Indian community.

Minister of Post-Secondary Education, Training & Labour, Mr. Greg Turner said in his remarks that recruitment and retention of nurses was a government priority, and the initiative between UNB and Manipal was an excellent example of a targeted initiative that would make a difference in growing the nursing workforce. He further said that the initiative would reduce barriers for immigrant nurses seeking employment in Canada and provide immediate employment opportunities for graduates.

Dr. Linu George joined Mr. Turner, Mr. Nath and Dr. Mazerolle in presenting each of the seven students with a red lab coat bearing the UNB logo.

The group's design aims to accommodate elderly couples, families with children, and single individuals, with spaces carefully designed to each users requirements.


His contribution to this project involves designing spaces for an elderly couple and two studio apartments while his colleagues have designed the other parts.




visit featured a tour of their cutting-edge facilities and an opportunity to meet the dedicated research team.

During his two year fellowship, he was able to work with some of the world leaders in oncology and supportive care in cancer at the Wilmot Cancer Institute. He was able to work



with cutting edge technology for the assessment of muscle function and sleep dysfunction in patients with cancer receiving chemo-radiotherapy. Dr. Samuel also spent time analyzing data from large randomized controlled trials that assessed the role of exercise in improving various health related outcomes in cancer survivors.

The Fulbright-Pai Fellowship Experience: Dr. Donna Howard's Journey at MAHE

Dr. Donna Howard is a public health practitioner, with training in global health and the social behavioral determinants of health. During her sabbatical year at the University of Maryland (UMD) in 2008, she received a Fulbright-Pai Fellowship to travel to India as a visiting scholar within the Department of Community Medicine at Manipal University, now known as Manipal Academy of Higher Education (MAHE). Her responsibilities included providing lectures to students on public health in the USA, facilitating discussions with faculty and administrative



leadership on how to more fully/formally integrate public health into the academic curricula, comentoring students, participating in university and local conferences, and immersing herself in the culture and community at MAHE.

While being a Fulbright-Pai Fellow at MAHE, she had enriching and immersive educational and cultural experiences, and developed a deeper appreciation of the strengths, as well as the shortcomings, of the U.S. public health system. Her interactions with faculty and students at MAHE broadened her understanding of the public health issues that affect our global community. She returned as a more insightful and sensitive teacher/mentor/researcher as a result of her Fulbright experiences. She also published an article with colleagues at MAHE on merging public health case studies of community based service learning practices from India and the U.S. It was semi-titled "Borrowing from the East to strengthen the West". Of note, in 2009 MAHE created a Department of Public Health and then launched its very own Prasanna School of Public Health in 2017.

Her Fulbright experience was much better than she expected. Regardless of where she went, whether it be in rural communities or urban housing developments, people would openly express warm wishes, offer hospitality and extend authentic kindness in ways that touched her profoundly. What also surprised and inspired her, continuously, was the extent of the campus-community partnerships and commitment by MAHE to collaborate with surrounding villages and urban communities to establish programs to enhance the health and well-being of its members.

Upon returning to UMD, she was determined to expose students to the insights and enriching experiences that she gained while in India, and so she developed a winter study abroad program. This program: "East Meets West: Contrasting Public Health Priorities, Pragmatics and Polemics in the U.S. and India" has become a yearly tradition, beginning with its inception in 2010. The course is designed for students who are interested in public health in a global context, and exposes them to policy and programmatic frameworks for the delivery of public health services in both the USA and India.


The factors that went into Dr. Howard's decision-making regarding where to apply for a Fulbright included the length of stay, the discipline in which she would be affiliated, and the ability to teach and engage without formal training in a language she had limited competency.

Dr. Howard has to say that the Fulbright Scholars program provides an unparalleled opportunity for students to immerse themselves in another cultural context, participate in programs, both academic and community based, and immeasurably expand their cultural humility and appreciation for the richness of our global community. She also feels that in the early stages of considering a Fulbright, it's also important for students to spend critical time authentically appraising their interests/intentions, strengths and assets, what they hope to gain, how they hope to contribute to the global community and how the Fulbright experience fits in with their career plans.




During the observership program, the students got the opportunity to learn from other students and faculty, experience the clinics and the cultural festivities in their respective colleges.

The Principal Investigator of the SPARC project is Dr. Lena Ashok, Professor, Department of Social and Health Innovation, and Co-Investigators Dr. Teddy Andrews JJ, Associate Professor, Department of Social and Health Innovation, and Dr. Varalakshmi Chandra Sekaran, Associate Professor, Department of Health Policy, Prasanna School of Public Health, Manipal Academy of Higher Education, Manipal. Dr. Kalpana Goel, Lecturer, University of South Australia (UniSA) – Justice & Society, and Dr. Abraham Francis, Associate Professor, Social Work and Human Services, James Cook University, Australia are the International Investigators.

Engaging intellectually with administrative and faculty members, who radiated passion and competence in their disciplines, was one of the highlights of the scholar's visit to UniSA. The collaboration with UniSA resulting from the SPARC project led to opportunities to participate in research proposal writing workshops by Dr. Wendy Bastalich, Research Education Advisor, and continued working on the systematic review with Dr. Kalpana Goel, Lecturer and Elvis Munyoka, Ph.D. Scholar. This was followed by experiences of visiting community organizations such as Community Outreach Centre UniSA, Mind Australia, Multicultural Aged Care, Uniting Communities, and The Men Shed. The scholars observed how different organizations extended their support with compassion and dedication in uplifting vulnerable individuals from various communities across Australia

The research scholars participated in the Australian and Middle Eastern and North African (MENA) Perspectives, a hybrid symposium between Adelaide – Cairo on 18 April 2024 at Flinders University College of Business, Government and Law, with support from The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade through its esteemed Council of Australia-Arab Relations (CAAR). The scholars learnt about the importance of supporting aged care providers to deliver culturally appropriate care to older people from Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) communities, as well as to help older CALD people and their families make informed decisions about their aged care needs. Additionally, the city of Adelaide offered plenty of opportunities to experience the vibrant Australian culture by visiting tourist attractions such as St Francis Xavier Cathedral, Morialta Conservation Park, Glenelg beach, Mount Lofty, The Cleland Wildlife Park, Harbor Town, Rundle mall and Victoria square.





The visit to the James Cook University campuses at Brisbane, Townsville and Cairns was supervised by Dr. Abraham Francis, and guided by faculty members – Dr. Hyacinth Udah, Dr. Albert Kuruvila, and Ms. Jo Bentley Davey. The scholars were one of the facilitators for the workshop titled "Women and wellbeing: Connections, conversations and collective flourishing," organized by United Malayalees of Queensland (UMQ), on 5 May 2024 at Holland Park Library, Brisbane. They addressed the gathering on issues related to the mothers of adolescents on 'Navigating life's transitions: Strategies for enhancing women's well-being' and 'Staying connected: Strengthening parent-adolescent relationship,' backed by research evidence. This provided a platform to several women, living in different parts of Brisbane and having diverse professions/ occupations and personal interests, to come together to connect and converse with each other. The scholars then attended the panel discussion on collective flourishing facilitated by Dr. Abraham Francis at the QLD Parliament House, Brisbane. Hon. James Martin MP – Member for Stretton, Senator Paul Scarr - Senator for QLD, Cr Emil Kim - Councilor for Calamvale, Mr. Palani Thevar – Social worker & patron of Federation of Indian Communities of Queensland (FICQ), and Mr. Ashish Katta - Entrepreneur & patron of Indian Council of Australia Queensland (ICAQ) were the panelists. It was noteworthy that the panel included political leaders from three different tiers of the government, community leaders and entrepreneurs. The scholars were able to connect and discuss with the government officials at great lengths about their respective research areas.

The research scholars participated in the Labor Day celebrations observed on 6 May 2024 – a day to celebrate the achievements of workers within, and for, their community. This provided an opportunity to interact with Premier of Queensland - Steven Miles, Deputy Premier of Queensland - Cameron Dick, State Member for Mansfield - Corrine Macmillan, MP Bart Mellish, Mr. Palani Thevar- community leader and other prominent political leaders. The scholars participated in the community leader's dinner forum hosted by Multicultural Australia & QPASTT at the Brisbane Multicultural Centre and had the opportunity of meeting and greeting multicultural community leaders along with minister for Multicultural Affairs – Hon. Charis Mullen. The research scholars also visited the University of Queensland – St. Lucia Campus, Cathedral of St Stephens, Festival of chariots by Hare Krishna Food for Life, Museum of Brisbane, Brisbane Riverwalk, and the tourist attractions on South Bank Parklands.

At the Townsville campus of JCU named 'Bebegu Yumba,' the scholars attended learning sessions on 'Therapeutic approaches' by Dr Albert Kuruvila, 'Research Writing and Publication' and 'Social Psychology and Human Behavior: Lifespan Development' by Dr. Hyacinth Udah, and 'Community Development: Challenges and Limitations' by Dr. Jacek Zuchowski. A research meeting for early career researchers attended by the research scholars was facilitated by Dr. Tamra Jones, Lecturer





with a purpose of understanding the innovations happening in research within the JCU campus, and for collaboration. The research scholars toured the campus facilities, with the Eddie Koiki Mabo library and the terrarium being the main attractions. The scholars met with Dr. Shashidhar Venkatesh Murthy – Associate Professor and Head of Pathology, College of Medicine and Dentistry, James Cook University – who has been an alumnus of Manipal Academy of Higher Education (MAHE), Manipal. The scholars toured the museums, art gallery, the dam, the beaches, and the cathedral of Townsville.

The visit to JCU Cairns, Smithfield campus 'Nguma-bada' offered an enriching experience of learning through sessions on 'Working with Culturally and Diverse (CALD) Communities' facilitated by Jo Bentley Davey. Visiting community organizations like Centacare FNQ, Centacare Thomas Street, The Junction Clubhouse, provided an insight into offering mental health support to the community within clinical and non-clinical spaces. As a part of cultural immersion, the scholars attended the Eddie Koiki Mabo lecture presented by Prof. Ngiare Brown, Chancellor, James Cook University at Bulmba-ja Arts Centre. The Esplanade Lagoon, Palm Cove, Fitzroy Island, and the Kuranda Village offered a breathtaking view of the tropical landscape of Cairns.

All in all, the scholars had a holistic experience of research, capacity building, conducting workshops, teaching, understanding of social service organizations through visits as well as immersion into the Australian way of life. Setting out on a voyage across borders - from India to Australia - was a life-changing event that broadened perspectives, disproved assumptions, and encouraged lifelong learning.

35 middle-level nursing Managers (Ward in charge and team Leaders) completed the CNE and obtained certificates. The major topics covered were effective leadership styles in Nursing, team building and collaboration - strategies for fostering effective interdisciplinary teamwork, change management in Nursing, ethical decision-making in nursing leadership, nursing empowerment, implementing evidence-based practices to enhance patient outcomes and safety, cultural competence in nursing leadership — DEI principle, emotional intelligence, strategic planning and resource management, communication skills, appreciation and motivation skills, patient-centered care, performance improvement in nursing leadership, cost reduction and containment and Nurse as an innovation leader.

The CNE incorporated hands-on learning in effective communication, team building, improving motivation skills and usage of the Pareto chart in cost reduction. A pretest was conducted before the CNE, and the scores were analyzed and later compared with a post-test after the CNE.




