2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

- 1. A training program on fire drill was organized for all the staff to increase the awareness on the emergency preparedness in case of fire. The program was conducted by Fire safety department of Kasturba Hospital. During the program, a lecture on various aspects of emergency preparedness was discussed along with the different classes of fires, extinguishers and their use. The program also consisted of a demonstration on the use of CO₂ based fire extinguisher. The program ended with a mock drill exercise.
- 2. A two-day training program was conducted for Dental Surgery Assistants to improve the skill in the manipulation of various dental materials used during the clinical situations. The program involved lectures on the composition and clinical applications of materials used followed by hands on training on their manipulation.

The college is actively involved in the curriculum development through discussion during board of studies meeting which are organized twice a year. External experts and feedback of students are discussed during the board of studies meeting along with the performance of the students.

- The follow up and fulfilment of the planned academic program will be audited once in six months.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- A total three internal examinations are conducted in an academic year. The performance of the students at the end of each internal assessment is analysed and the poor performers and slow learners are regularly counselled by the concerned faculty members.
- A decision to enforce minimum of 3 marks out of 10 in the internal assessment to be eligible to write the university examination was introduced from 2015-16 onwards.
